

was chosen for spring 2005.

The Orchard: A Memoir by Adele 'Kitty' Robertson was first published in 1995. The unfinished manuscript for this book was discovered by Kitty's daughter, Betsy Cramer, under a

pile of newspapers and newsprint after her mother's death in 1979. It tells the story of a woman's attempt to survive The Great Depression on her family's farm in Ipswich, Massachusetts. It is a beautifully written memoir filled with local color. Kitty's determination to succeed in making a living from her apple orchard carries the story forward. In this book you will meet people of all types who lived and worked in this community. Many of their children and grandchildren still live here. Much will be familiar to readers in this story, although life in suburban Ipswich today seems far removed from the more rural and insulated town of the 1930's.

We hope that **Ipswich Reads...One Book!** Will become an annual event in this community. We encourage you to enjoy the programs and activities included in this brochure, but especially to savor this quietly lyrical account of life in this town in the 1930's.
