

About the book...

The Primrose Way is an engaging novel that vividly portrays the challenges faced by the first settlers in Ipswich. The heroine, Rebekah Hall, leaves a comfortable life in England to join her father in the new settlement of Ipswich in the Massachusetts Bay Colony. Rebekah's encounters with the Native American population and her growing respect for their customs and beliefs place her in conflict with some of her neighbors. Although written with young adults in mind, *The Primrose Way* is rich with historical information about early Ipswich. It is also an exciting narrative and a fine read. As the *Kirkus Reviews* said of the book: "Politically contemporary, and not historically impossible—a rousing good tale."

This book was an appropriate choice to read and discuss as part of the 375th Celebration of the Town of Ipswich.

It is also an entertaining and enlightening story which should stimulate discussion on themes of authority, religious tolerance and cross-cultural interaction.

Her historic novels for young adults include *Nothing to Fear*, about an impoverished immigrant family in New York City in the 1930's, *Someday*, about the disruptions in a young girl's life when her hometown is swallowed up by the construction of the Quabbin Reservoir, and *The Primrose Way*, an award-winning novel, set in Ipswich, about the relationships between the earliest settlers and the Native Americans they encountered.

Koller and her husband George have three grown children. They live in Westfield, Massachusetts along with two Labrador retrievers, Cassie & Tess.
