# **Redesigned Spaces...**

The initial phase of redesigning spaces in the Ipswich Public Library has been completed. We invite you to take a tour around the Library and look...

### New Teen Room

The newly expanded Teen Room was designed by Ipswich teens and is now designated for their use only. With new furnishings generously funded by the Board of Library, the Room currently offers spaces for homework, reading, socializing, or other library activities. Reference and Teen Librarian Katy Wuerker has significantly offered a variety of programs for teens since the past year.

### **The Browsing Room**

A year ago, the Friends of the Ipswich Library unveiled <u>the Elm Table</u>, made by local craftsman Fred Rossi from the wood of the storied Ameri-




can elm that stood at the corner of County Street and East Streets, until it succumbed to Dutch elm disease and was cut down in 2012. The elm tree had a long history in the town, estimated to

be about 200 years old, and was referenced in the work of late author and Ipswich resident John Updike, and others. Now, Rossi has worked his magic again, using the remaining elm to create custom-designed display gondolas for the library's main browsing room. This new bookstore-style layout encourages people to browse through new books and other materials. The new gondolas were funded using the State Aid to Public Libraries grant, awarded to towns annually by the Massachusetts Board of Library Commissioners.

## **The Friends Book Shop**

The Friends of the Library have been hard at work setting up their new book shop -- right here in the library -- which is now open all the time during regular library hours, and continuously restocked by Friends volunteers with donated items from the public. All proceeds from the shop go directly toward funding library programs, furnishings, equipment, and services.
