1. Biographical Note

Emma Safford (1879¹ - 1958²) was born to Jacob Cheever Safford (1839-1907)³ and Emma Jane Mitchell Safford (1847-1932)⁴ in Ipswich on June 16, 1879, the third child of five. On her father's side, Emma Safford is descended from Prince, a slave in the Safford family of Ipswich, who married in 1780 a Cogswell family slave named Kate (Catherine, Katherine.)⁵ Their son James married Peeley (Pelee, Peely) Cheever. This union produced Jacob, Emma's grandfather. In Waters' *Ipswich in the Massachusetts Bay Colony* reference is made to this family - "the widow and children of Jacob are still among us, highly respected by all."6

Emma Safford's mother was Emma Jane Mitchell Safford, whose family can be traced to the Wampanoag Sachem Massasoit. For this reason, female family members in Emma Jane Mitchell Safford's family were referred to as "Princesses."

The available evidence suggests that the younger Emma Safford lived in Ipswich her entire life. She attended public schools in Ipswich. Miss Safford supported herself by helping families around their houses and with their children. Upon her death in 1958, Safford's obituary stated she was "very highly regarded by all who had contact with her." Miss Emma Safford is buried in the Old North Cemetery in Ipswich (a transcription of the gravestone is included with this description.)

2. Scope and Content of Collection

The Emma Safford papers are a collection of manuscripts, photographs, newspaper clippings, correspondence, and artifacts relating to the Safford and Mitchell families. There is information in the manuscripts and clippings in the collection which relates to Native Americans in Massachusetts, specifically in the undated document entitled "Court of Land Registration" which documents the ownership of contested family land dating back to one of the Mitchell ancestors, King Phillip. King Phillip was also named Metacom, and was a son of Massasoit. The newspaper clippings also document the geneaology of the Mitchell family and indicate the lineage of Emma Safford extending as far back as Massasoit.

Noteworthy as well are the 24 photographs in the collection. In addition to documenting the Mitchell family's Native American heritage, the photographs also represent Ipswich environmental history as there are several photographs of the homes and structures

occupied by the family in Ipswich. The bulk of the photographs are of Miss Emma Safford, Mrs. Emma Safford, and their houses.

The small amount of correspondence contains a group of letters from children in Ipswich who were fourth graders in 1958. These letters contain information about the town of Ipswich and the families of the correspondents (there are 31 correspondents.)

3. Acquisition Note

The note on many items in the collection reads "Gift Dr. Wilder Estate Miss Emma Safford 1959." This is the only indication of the provenance of the collection. Most likely, the Ipswich dentist by the name of Dr. Wilder played a role in securing the collection for the public library in Ipswich. There is no evidence in the minutes of the meetings of the library's trustees to indicate exactly how the collection came to the library.
