
### Discover your family tree in the Library.

This edition of Ancestry offers a comprehensive research experience combining its advanced search technology and image viewing of original documents on Ancestry.com.

Ancestry Library Edition provides access to billions of historical documents, millions of historical photos, local narratives, oral histories, indexes, and other resources in over 30,000 databases that span from the 1500s to the 2000s. You can easily search for census, birth, death/obituary, military, and immigration records from early America to the present.

### Gordon Harris' "Ipswich in History" Program Drew Inquisitive Crowd for an Engaging Look Into the Past





45 in-person and 38 virtual attendees joined Gordon Harris on March 21st in the Collins Meeting Room to see his illuminating presentation "Ipswich in History: Slavery & The Underground Railroad". Participants learned about key figures in Ipswich history during slavery and the Civil War, from slaveholders to the enslaved and those who fiercely advocated for abolition here in town. Harris also connected the history of the Underground Railroad in the Ipswich area to the greater context of what was occurring in Massachusetts and across the country during the Civil War in this fantastic program.

# Eco-friendly Induction Cooktops Are Now Available in IPL's Library of Things Thanks to Community Partnerships



The Center for Ecotechnology (CET) and the Ipswich Electric Light Department have partnered with the Ipswich Public Library to pilot their Induction Lending Program, which is funded by TD Bank's Community Climate Fund. CET is committed to spreading the word about the environmental, health, and economic benefits of making the switch to induction cooktops.

Unlike gas, propane, and electric cooktops, which use an open flame or heating element, induction cooking uses electromagnetic energy to heat pots and pans directly. Induction stoves can reduce cooking carbon emissions by half and eliminate harmful indoor air pollution. Induction is also considered safer, because only the pan is heated. In addition, the improved efficiency can reduce cooking time by up to 50%. Plus, with their smooth surfaces, induction cooktops are a breeze to clean!

You can easily check out the Induction Cooktop kit from the Library of Things by coming into the Library or by putting a reserve on it through our catalog if it's checked out to another patron. The kit includes cookware and accessories along with the induction cooktop. Bon appétit!






